GLACIER BAY ESCAPE

5-Day Sea Kayaking Exploration of Alaska's Glacier Bay

Glacier Bay's fascinating geology, plentiful wildlife (including the humpback whale), and breathtaking scenery of soaring mountains and gorgeous tidewater glaciers are the setting for an unforgettable wilderness experience—one of the best in Alaska!

On this trip you'll enjoy a relaxed exploration of Glacier Bay National Park's scenic West Arm, including the pristine wilderness of Johns Hopkins Inlet. You'll start with a charter boat trip across the lower bay, then after a drop-off on a remote glacial beach, spend the next few days kayaking and camping amidst awesome mountain scenery and stunning tidewater glaciers, and taking short hikes to observe some of the interesting geological and biological processes so evident in Glacier Bay.

You'll watch for wildlife on both land and sea, learn about the fascinating natural and cultural history of the bay, and see land recently unveiled by retreating ice thousands of years old. This is one of our most popular and active trips, where expectations are always exceeded.



ITINERARY

Note—A number of different itineraries are possible, depending on weather, park service regulations, and group desires. We will try to adhere to the following schedule and choose the best route for exploring the waters of the park.

DAY 1 ~ Juneau – Gustavus

Travel to Juneau, Alaska and meet an Alaska Discovery Representative and the group at the Air Excursions ticket desk at 3:30 p.m. We'll board the plane for the flight to Gustavus, the gateway to Glacier Bay National Park, then transfer to a cozy B&B. After settling in, we'll gather for a trip orientation with your guide—a must-attend event! You will learn about bear-country camping techniques, and be issued rain gear and rubber boots. Dinner and lodging are included this evening.

D...Annie Mae Lodge or Similar

DAY 2 ~ To Glacier Bay

After an early breakfast we will board a boat for a spectacular ride into the West Arm of Glacier Bay National Park. The scenery changes dramatically as we leave the lush forests of Bartlett Cove behind and enter a land still under the influence of the Little Ice Age.

We'll be dropped off in the remote upper West Arm, where we'll unload gear and have a kayak lesson. By afternoon, everyone will feel comfortable enough with sea kayaking to fully observe the splendid beauty of this area.

B,L,D...Camp

DAYS 3-4 ~ West Arm, Glacier Bay

We'll explore the pristine upper fjords of Glacier Bay by kayak and on foot. Keep your camera ready for dramatic scenery of awe-inspiring 9,000-foot mountain peaks and calving glaciers (you'll listen to them thunder, crackle, and pop as huge icebergs topple into the sea!), and wildlife that may include brown bears, mountain goats, humpback whales, orcas, sea otters, and a variety of sea birds. A flexible itinerary allows for fabulous hikes and serene paddles. You may explore Reid, Lamplugh, and Johns Hopkins Glaciers, each with its own stunning beauty and personality.

Depending on the group, we will either stay at one base camp all three nights or move camp just once to allow more time for kayaking and hiking. Explorations on foot give us an increased understanding of this unique ecosystem and provide us with stunning views.

Nights will be spent camping on the scenic wilderness shores. Our two-person kayaks are stable and easy to use. A foot-controlled rudder system allows the stern paddler to steer the boat in any direction. Each boat will carry personal gear, as well as a share of the group food and camp gear.

B,L,D each day...Camp

DAY 5 ~

After an early breakfast, we'll pack up camp, then paddle and prepare for our boat pick-up and a leisurely ride back to park headquarters at Gustavus. Put your feet up and watch the terrific scenery and wildlife as you relax and rest

John Muir came to Glacier Bay in 1879 and was so stunned by its epic beauty that immediately upon his return he began to secure wilderness protection for this spectacular region he called "unspeakably pure and sublime." Come join us as we retrace the famous naturalist's route, and observe how the dynamic world of the bay changes continuously as receding glaciers reveal new landscapes.

The flight from Gustavus to Juneau is about a half hour, and lands at Juneau's main airport where you can connect with your homeward-bound flight. 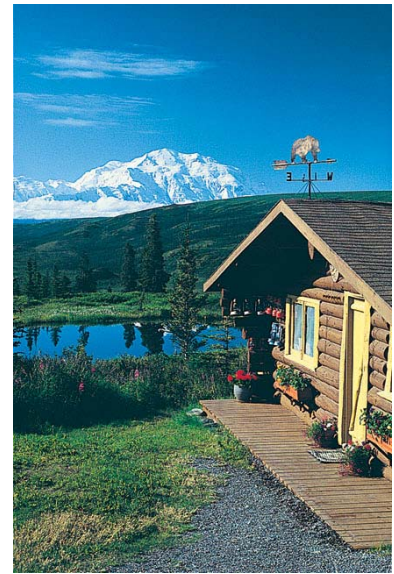
EXTEND YOUR ADVENTURE!

Make the most of your visit to the Land of the Midnight Sun! If you like to explore on your own, plan to arrive a day or two early or extend your trip after the tour. We also offer other short trips to Alaska, including *Denali National Park*, *Whales of Point Adolphus*, and *Bears of Pack Creek*.

Denali National Park. For an incredible wildlife experience, consider a stay at Camp Denali, a beautiful natural haven deep in the heart of Denali National Park. For over 50 years Camp Denali has inspired people from around the world. Not less than eight major peaks of the Alaska Range command the view from its unique hillside location and Mount McKinley is mirrored in the still waters of its natural centerpiece, Nugget Pond. Daily activities include hiking the backcountry with expert naturalist-guides, canoeing, mountain biking, fishing, and flight seeing—each day you can choose which suits you best! Rustic but beautifully-appointed guest cabins have superlative mountain views of Denali, and are a short walk to the historic hand-hewn lodge and informal dining room where sumptuous meals are served. 3- to 7-night stays. June-September

Whales of Point Adolphus. Join us for this easy but exciting kayaking and camping adventure at Point Adolphus, where underwater land formations and strong tidal currents create Alaska's most active whale feeding area. You'll start with a scenic cruise aboard a charter boat from Gustavus to our deluxe camp at Point Adolphus, then, after a thorough kayak lesson, test your paddling skills in the calm waters. Days are spent kayaking and watching for orcas, sea lions, eagles, sea birds, and humpback whales (we're one of the few companies to offer the opportunity to see whales up close from a kayak!), hiking the beaches, or exploring the old-growth rainforest of Chichagof Island. And if you like to fish, bring your fishing pole, buy a license, and see if you can catch a trout or salmon (if they are running) for dinner! At night, enjoy scrumptious dinners, then fall asleep under the canopy of the Tongass National Forest, the largest intact temperate rainforest in the world, while listening to the blows of whales frolicking just offshore. 3-days. June-September. Land cost from \$995 + per night tax (per person, double occupancy)

Bears of Pack Creek. Where else can you take a scenic floatplane trip, kayak into a rainforest wilderness, and see Alaskan brown bears? Join us for one of the world's best bear viewing experiences on Admiralty Island, a lush rainforest wilderness with the largest density of brown bears in the world. In fact, the native Tlingit People call the island Kootznoowoo, the "Fortress of the Bears." From Juneau, a scenic floatplane flight brings you to a secluded beach and our comfortable base camp. From here you'll kayak the shores of Admiralty Island National Monument,

looking for brown bears, eagles, and marine wildlife. You'll also paddle to the world-famous Stan Price/Pack Creek Brown Bear Sanctuary to spend a full day observing bears up-close, with a chance to see family groups with playful cubs grazing the meadows or fishing the stream. Single Supplement—\$190 for “requested” singles; \$85 for “forced” singles. If you prefer single accommodations, you must pay the Single Supplement Fee. If you're traveling alone and wish to share accommodations, we'll try our best to find you a roommate. If that's not possible, we will only charge you half of the single supplement.

Tier Pricing

Adventure travel works best with a small group of people. In order to operate these small groups, our trips are priced according to the number of full-price passengers on the trip. (Alaska Discovery staff, trip doctors, and other discounted travelers are excluded from the count for this purpose.) We initially invoice you at the highest tier level price (the smallest group size we can operate). If the price drops due to an increase in group size, you will be refunded the difference.

What's Included

- ◆ accommodations and all arrangements in the field, including camp meals, guides, group gear and equipment (2-person tents)
- ◆ meals as noted (B=Breakfast, L=Lunch, D=Dinner)

What's Not

Airfare to and from Juneau, Alaska; meals not noted in itinerary; daypack for yourself to carry daily items; insurance other than basic medical and evacuation insurance as noted above (we strongly recommend you purchase the supplementary trip insurance offered by Alaska Discovery, which includes trip cancellation insurance); optional tipping to leader, guides and local staff; excess baggage charges; airport taxes; and items of a personal nature (sodas, alcoholic beverages, laundry, etc.).

Air Travel

Airfare to and from Alaska is not included in the land cost of our trips. For air reservations, we recommend you contact the airlines directly. Please refer to the link or document called “Planning Your Trip to Alaska,” included in your Trip Packet. **But please check with our staff before purchasing or obtaining your tickets.** We need to verify your arrival and departure schedule and ensure we have enough participants to operate the trip.

Expert Leadership

Expert leadership is the key to an exciting, unforgettable experience. Our trips feature gifted leaders for whom leading trips is a true vocation. Besides showing you wonders you’d never find on your own, they make sure everything runs smoothly and safely without a hitch. They are knowledgeable about all aspects of your trip, and take great pleasure in sharing their insights with you. Activity Level

Alaska Discovery trips are designed for flexible, energetic people who like to be active. This trip operates at a relaxing pace, with paddling of 4-8 miles per day. No prior paddling experience is required, but you may need to paddle against strong currents and/or wind at times. In the field, there are no facilities of any kind (no permanent lodging, bathrooms, showers, phone booths!). Good physical condition, an adventurous spirit, a positive attitude and a willingness to deal with possible wet, cold, and windy conditions are a must! You will set up your own tent (after a demonstration by the guide) and everyone is welcome to assist with other tasks of wilderness camping.

Physical conditioning before your trip will increase your enjoyment. You must be prepared to help carry personal and group gear as well as your kayak (about 65-80 pounds among four people) up and down the beach. The terrain is uneven and may be slippery. Be sure to hike in the boots you plan to bring with you well in advance of the trip (so you won’t get blisters). If you don’t normally follow a fitness or exercise regime, we recommend beginning one now!

Incorporate any activities that build up arm strength and flexibility. In paddling, it is more important to be able to maintain a steady pace than it is to have a powerful stroke.

Minimum age for participation is 12.
