BEARS OF PACK CREEK

Explore Admiralty Island, the “Fortress of the Bears”

Where else can you take a scenic floatplane trip, kayak into a rainforest wilderness, and see Alaskan brown bears? Join us for one of the world’s best bear viewing experiences on Admiralty Island, a lush rainforest wilderness with the largest density of brown bears in the world. In fact, the native Tlingit People call the island Kootznoowoo, the “Fortress of the Bears.”

From Juneau, a scenic floatplane flight brings you to a secluded beach and our comfortable base camp. From here you’ll kayak the shores of Admiralty Island National Monument, looking for brown bears, eagles, and marine wildlife. You’ll also paddle to the world-famous Stan Price/Pack Creek Brown Bear Sanctuary to spend a full day observing bears up-close, with a chance to see family groups with playful cubs grazing the meadows or fishing the stream. We’re the only company to offer overnight trips to the Pack Creek area, and our trips are timed for absolutely the *best* bear viewing opportunities!



ITINERARY

☞ Rendezvous—This trip begins in Juneau, Alaska, on Day 1. You should arrive in Juneau at least one day prior to departure date as there will be a pre-trip meeting the morning of Day 1. We recommend you stay at the Goldbelt Hotel (51 Egan Dr., downtown Juneau, 888-478-6909 or 586-6900). The hotel offers a complimentary shuttle, but you must call them for a pickup. There is a hotel phone in the baggage claim area at the Juneau airport.

DAY 1 ~ Juneau – Stan Price Brown Bear Sanctuary at Pack Creek

Your guide will pick you up by 9:00 a.m. You will meet your guides and other guests, get oriented to the trip area, and learn about bear-country camping techniques. Your guides will issue personal gear, including waterproof bags, rubber boots, and rain gear. Our departure is scheduled for the mid-morning. You may leave any extra luggage at our Juneau warehouse. After the meeting we will transfer to the airport. There, we board a floatplane for a scenic flight down the Seymour Canal to Admiralty Island in the heart of brown bear country. This is a short but beautiful flight over the tremendous old growth forests blanketing the island.

We will set up a base camp on a point south of Pack Creek and have our first kayaking lesson. The pace is leisurely as we paddle and explore the gentle shoreline, rocky and sandy beaches, and fantastic old growth forests of Admiralty Island along the way. Our two-person kayaks are stable and easy to use. A foot-controlled rudder system allows the stern paddler to steer the boat in any direction, and each twosome will soon feel like old hands at this skill.

L,D...Camp

DAY 2 ~ Stan Price Brown Bear Sanctuary at Pack Creek

After a hearty breakfast, we paddle our way down a channel for about an hour to the shores of the Stan Price Brown Bear Sanctuary at Pack Creek on Admiralty Island. (Keep your eyes out for curious seals and jumping salmon!) Once on the beach, we hike to the best viewing spots in the refuge. The salmon should be running, bringing bears and eagles to the shores of Pack Creek, and we will have an excellent chance to observe bears in their natural habitat.

As Admiralty Island has one of the highest densities of brown bears in the world, other areas on the island, such as Windfall Harbor, could provide bear viewing opportunities as well. We will also watch for loons, eagles, seals, whales, and other wildlife.

There are no facilities of any kind at pack creek; it is managed as pure wilderness. We will bring our own lunch and strictly follow the important forest service regulations. In the late afternoon, we will paddle back to our campsite, where Sitka spruce and western hemlock trees, hundreds of years old, tower above us at night while we gaze across the salt waters surrounding Admiralty Island.

DAY 3 ~ Stan Price Brown Bear Sanctuary at Pack Creek – return to Juneau

After breakfast, we pack up camp and go for a last paddle. We return to camp for lunch and meet our charter floatplanes for another beautiful flight over the northern half of Admiralty Island and back to Juneau. We plan on arriving in the mid-afternoon. Once back, we'll drop you off at your accommodations (cost on your own). We suggest making lodging reservations for this evening and flying out no earlier than the next morning just in case our pickup is delayed.

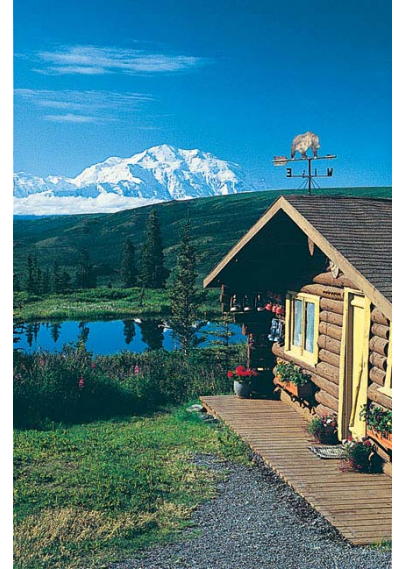
EXTEND YOUR ADVENTURE!

Make the most of your visit to the Land of the Midnight Sun! If you like to explore on your own, plan to arrive a day or two early or extend your trip after the tour. We also offer other short trips to Alaska, including *Denali National Park*, *Whales of Point Adolphus*, *Bears of Pack Creek*, and *Glacier Bay Escape*.

Denali National Park. For an incredible wildlife experience, consider a stay at Camp Denali, a beautiful natural haven deep in the heart of Denali National Park. For over 50 years Camp Denali has inspired people from around the world. Not less than eight major peaks of the Alaska Range command the view from its unique hillside location and Mount McKinley is mirrored in the still waters of its natural centerpiece, Nugget Pond. Daily activities include hiking the backcountry with expert naturalist-guides, canoeing, mountain biking, fishing, and flight seeing—each day you can choose which suits you best! Rustic but beautifully-appointed guest cabins have superlative mountain views of Denali, and are a short walk to the historic hand-hewn lodge and informal dining room where sumptuous meals are served. Evening programs presented by staff naturalists and visiting specialists are designed to further acquaint you with the Far North. Call us for details!

3- to 7-night stays. June-September

Land Cost: \$1,425-\$3,325; \$1,069-\$2,494 (children 11 and younger) + per night tax (per person, double occupancy)



Whales of Point Adolphus. Join us for this easy but exciting kayaking and camping adventure at Point Adolphus, where underwater land formations and strong tidal currents create Alaska's most active whale feeding area. You'll start with a scenic cruise aboard a charter boat from Gustavus to our deluxe camp at Point Adolphus, then, after a thorough kayak lesson, test your paddling skills in the calm waters. Days are spent kayaking and watching for orcas, sea lions, eagles, sea birds, and humpback whales (we're one of the few companies to offer the opportunity to see whales up close from a kayak!), hiking the beaches, or exploring the old-growth rainforest of Chichagof Island. And if you like to fish, bring your fishing pole, buy a license, and see if you can catch a trout or salmon (if they are running) for dinner! At night, enjoy scrumptious dinners, then fall asleep under the canopy of the Tongass National Forest, the largest intact temperate rainforest in the world, while listening to the blows of whales frolicking just offshore. A charter boat returns you to Gustavus.

3-days. June-September. Land cost from \$995 + per night tax (per person, double occupancy)

Glacier Bay Escape. Glacier Bay's fascinating geology, plentiful wildlife (including the humpback whale), and breathtaking scenery of soaring mountains and gorgeous tidewater glaciers are the setting for an unforgettable wilderness experience—one of the best in Alaska! On this trip you'll enjoy a relaxed exploration of Glacier Bay National Park's scenic West Arm, including the pristine wilderness of Johns Hopkins Inlet. You'll start with a charter boat trip across the lower bay, then after a drop-off on a remote glacial beach, spend the next few days kayaking and camping amidst awesome mountain scenery and stunning tidewater glaciers, and taking short hikes to observe some of the interesting geological and biological processes so evident in Glacier Bay. You'll watch for wildlife on both land and sea, learn about the fascinating natural and cultural history of the bay, and see land

recently unveiled by retreating ice thousands of years old. This is one of our most popular and active trips, where expectations are always exceeded.

What's Not

Airfare to and from Juneau, Alaska; accommodation in Juneau; meals not noted in itinerary; daypack for yourself to carry daily items; sleeping bag and pad (available for rent from Alaska Discovery for \$40); insurance other than basic medical and evacuation insurance as noted above (we strongly recommend you purchase the supplementary trip insurance offered by Alaska Discovery, which includes trip cancellation insurance); optional tipping to leader, guides and local staff; excess baggage charges; airport taxes; and items of a personal nature (sodas, alcoholic beverages, laundry, etc.).

Air Travel

Airfare to and from Alaska is not included in the land cost of our trips. For air reservations, we recommend you contact the airlines directly. Please refer to the link or document called "Planning Your Trip to Alaska," included in your Trip Packet. **But please check with our staff before purchasing or obtaining your tickets.** We need to verify your arrival and departure schedule and ensure we have enough participants to operate the trip.

WHAT YOU CAN EXPECT

Expert Leadership

Expert leadership is the key to an exciting, unforgettable experience. Our trips feature gifted leaders for whom leading trips is a true vocation. Besides showing you wonders you'd never find on your own, they make sure everything runs smoothly and safely without a hitch. They are knowledgeable about all aspects of your trip, and take great pleasure in sharing their insights with you. Activity Level

Alaska Discovery trips are designed for flexible, energetic people who like to be active. This trip operates at a relaxing pace, with paddling of 2-6 miles per day. No prior paddling experience is required, but you may need to paddle against strong currents and/or wind at times. In the field, there are no facilities of any kind (no permanent lodging, bathrooms, showers, phone booths!). Good physical condition, an adventurous spirit, a positive attitude and a willingness to deal with possible wet, cold, and windy conditions are a must! You will set up your own tent (after a demonstration by the guide) and everyone is welcome to assist with other tasks of wilderness camping.

Physical conditioning before your trip will increase your enjoyment. You must be prepared to help carry personal and group gear as well as your kayak (about 65-80 pounds among two to four people) up and down the beach. The terrain is uneven and may be slippery. Be sure to hike in the boots you plan to bring with you well in advance of the trip (so you won't get blisters). If you don't normally follow a fitness or exercise regime, we recommend beginning one now! Incorporate any activities that build up arm strength and flexibility. In paddling, it is more important to be able to maintain a steady pace than it is to have a powerful stroke.

Minimum age for participation is 12.
