DENALI NATIONAL PARK: CAMP DENALI & NORTH FACE LODGE

Make the most of your visit to the Land of the Midnight Sun! For an incredible wildlife experience, consider a stay at Camp Denali, a beautiful natural haven deep in the heart of Denali National Park. For over 50 years Camp Denali has inspired people from around the world. Not less than eight major peaks of the Alaska Range command the view from its unique hillside location and Mount McKinley is mirrored in the still waters of its natural centerpiece, Nugget Pond.

Daily activities include hiking the backcountry with expert naturalist-guides, canoeing, mountain biking, and fishing. Each day you can choose which suits you best! Your days of exploration can be enhanced by visits to the interactive Natural History Resource Center. Evening programs presented by staff naturalists and visiting specialists are designed to further acquaint you with the Far North.

Seventeen rustic but beautifully-appointed guest cabins have superlative mountain views of Denali and are a short walk to the historic hand-hewn lodge and informal dining room where sumptuous meals are served. Cabins reflect a comfortable, simple living style: a small wood burning stove for heat, wall-mounted propane lights, and a gas hot plate for heating water. Colorful patchwork quilts, crafted by the staff, and fine Alaskan artwork display an abiding attention to detail. You can wash in the privacy of your cabin, and each has a convenient “house out back.” Every hand-built outhouse is uncompromisingly sanitary, and Mount McKinley is even framed by a small heart in the door! A bathroom/shower building with private hot showers and changing rooms is located near the lodge and dining room.

When to Arrive

Plan to meet your driver/guides at the Denali Park Rail Station at 12:30 p.m. on Day 1 of your trip.

Arrival Day

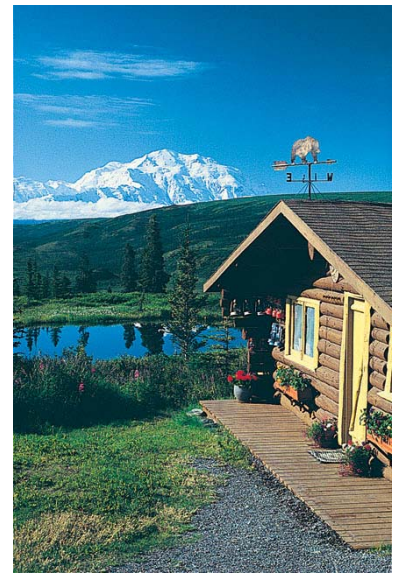
Your stay begins on the afternoon of your first night stay. Plan to meet your driver/guides at the Denali Park Rail Station at 12:30 p.m. Our departure is 1:30 p.m. and we stop en route for a picnic supper (the day's main meal) around 4:00 p.m. Upon your arrival at Camp Denali, you will be welcomed with fresh fruit, dessert, and hot beverages, and a short orientation before showing you to your cabin.

While you are at Camp Denali

Breakfast is at 7:30 a.m. each morning and after breakfast, your host and hostess will describe the guided options for the day. Each day, you may choose from three different levels of guided outings: an easier naturalist foray, or a moderate or strenuous outing.

There are also mountain bikes, canoes that are moored at the north end of Wonder Lake, just three miles away, and fishing gear for use at any time during your stay. Soon after breakfast, a lunch buffet will be presented, and you will be invited to design a sandwich of your choice on a variety of fresh-baked breads.

We plan to depart on our guided activities by 9-10:00 a.m. each day, so you can enjoy a full day in the heart of Denali National Park. Guided options return 3-5:00 p.m., and dinner is at 6:30. At 8:30 each evening there is a



program offered in the lodge. With a four-night stay, you will have three full days to explore and absorb the wilderness of this world-renowned national park.

Camp Denali is an authorized National Park Service Concessionaire. Also designated as Denali National Park's sole historic operator of educational guided hiking and field trips, this 30-year family owned and operated business continues its tradition of active exploration beyond its own spectacular area around Wonder Lake. That means you can explore more of the Park's remote alpine valleys and lofty ridges and enhance your opportunities for wildlife sightings.

Departure Day

On your departure morning, breakfast will be served at 6:00 a.m. and you will depart at 6:45 a.m., getting back to the Denali Park Rail Station by 11:30 a.m.

What's Included

What's Not

Transportation from home to Denali National Park rail station and return; insurance other than basic medical and evacuation insurance noted above (we strongly recommend you purchase the supplemental trip insurance offered by Mountain Travel Sobek, which includes trip cancellation insurance); optional tipping to Camp Denali staff; excess baggage charges; airport taxes; cost of medical immunizations; and items of a personal nature (sodas, alcoholic beverages, laundry, etc.).

Air Travel

Airfare is not included in the land cost of our trips. For air reservations, we recommend you contact the airlines directly, either by phone or the Internet. In addition, many travelers elect to use their “frequent flyer” miles when

traveling with us. **But please check with our staff before purchasing or obtaining your tickets.** We need to verify your arrival and departure schedule and ensure we have enough participants to operate the trip.

Activity Level

We rate this trip as easy to moderate, with some strenuous options for those who wish more challenging activities. All activities are optional, however you should be in good physical condition and enjoy an active life to fully appreciate what Camp Denali has to offer. *Note*—Minimum age for participation is 8.

Hiking at Camp Denali

Every day, guests have the option of one of three different levels of hiking:

Naturalist Foray hiking covers 1-2 miles daily using a vehicle to access a variety of locations. We will stop to observe the flora, fauna, and scenic vistas, while also taking a few short walks. Forays begin around 9am and return mid to late afternoon.

Moderate hikes cover 3-5 miles and experience elevation gains of 500-700 feet. The hiking is in trail-less tundra and may also be on river gravel bars. Hikes begin around 9 a.m. and return mid to late afternoon.

Strenuous hikes cover 5-8 miles with an elevation gain of 1,500-2,000 feet. The hiking is in trail-less tundra and may also be on river gravel bars. Hikes begin around 9 a.m. and return mid to late afternoon.

Hiking locations differ from day to day. On the first day of your stay at Camp Denali, hikes are led around the local area (because you have spent so long traveling the day before—we want to minimize the amount of time spent in a vehicle). On the following days, outings are generally focused up the park road (1,400 feet elevation) to explore the alpine regions of Denali. Guides can also help individuals plan and arrange their own local hikes as well.
