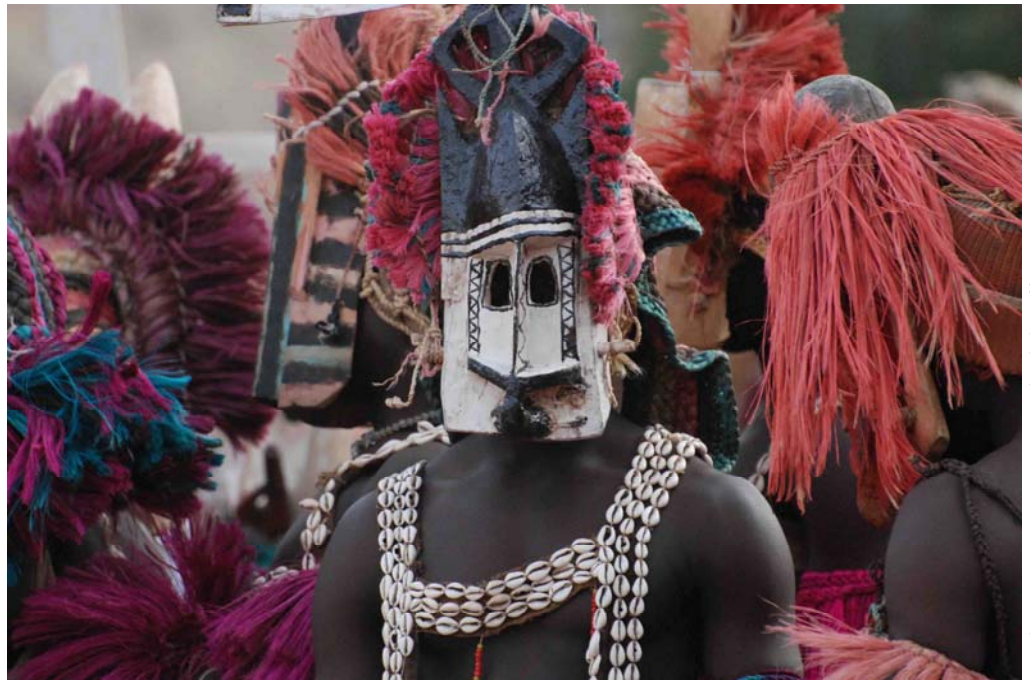

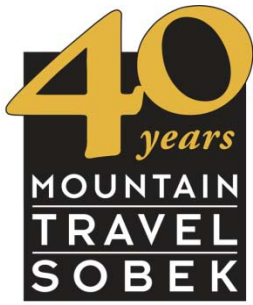

# ESSAKANE: MUSIC FESTIVAL OF THE DESERT

For years our music-loving clients have pleaded with us to add the Festival Au Desert to our Mali itinerary. We finally saw the light and put their dream trip together. Since its inception in 2001, the festival has become the throbbing center of the international African music scene. What started as a mostly Tuareg affair with dancing, swordplay, and camel races, has become a sophisticated three-day musical extravaganza that has opened its doors to renowned artists from all over the world.

But most of us don't travel halfway across the planet just to hear a concert or a good band. That's why we've packed the rest of this 14-day itinerary with travel through the most vibrant and mature of Saharan Africa cultures, which thrive intact in the ethnic mosaic of West Africa. From the camel-riding Tuareg nomads, to the noble "blue men" of the Sahara who roam the dunescapes around Timbuktu, to the very traditional Dogon, agriculturists known for their breathtaking mask dances and the pre-Islamic cosmology they have cherished for over 700 years—you'll be immersed in some of the richest and best-preserved tribal cultures remaining in Africa. Our program is unique, not duplicated by any other U.S. tour operator, and takes you far from the standard tourist circuits. You can expect a challenging—yet entirely enriching—adventure, an ethnologist's dream journey into a tradition-bound world.

From the capital of Bamako, we'll fly to Timbuktu, a mystical city in the heart of the Sahara. Historically, the salt trade was the main economy of the region. In this forgotten no-man's land, little has changed since the 16th century—once a great center of art and learning, Timbuktu is now a sleepy desert outpost that has become a synonym for "the back of beyond." We'll head out of Timbuktu in *pinasse*—a type of pirogue or small, flat-bottomed boat, particularly common with West African fishermen—on the Niger River, visiting villages as we go, and camping at night on the sand dunes that line the Niger's banks.

Then it's showtime! We'll spend two days at the Festival au Desert in the desert outpost of Essakane, dancing under the stars to the best beats in the world. Spend a few days with the animist Dogons, among the most tradition-bound people in all of Africa. Beginning in the 12th century, the Dogon moved to this part of Mali to escape Muslim expansion and preserve their traditional religion, which they continued to do throughout Africa's colonial era. With their ancestor worship and complex cosmology, they fascinate ethnologists and are the creators of some of the most fantastic art forms in Africa. We'll camp in remote villages visited by few other groups, and perhaps witness a wild and breathtaking Dogon mask dance.

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Engage in the hubbub of a local fishing community in Mopti, a traditional river port where dugouts still sail upriver from Timbuktu to bring slabs of salt to market from mines in the Sahara. Enjoy market day in the medieval town of Djenné, where little has changed since the 14th century. We'll continue through tradition-rich villages on our way to Segou, keeper of one of the most ancient histories of West Africa as the capital of the ancient Bambara kingdom. Join us to discover the magic, tradition, and rhythm of Mali!

*Note—This is a rugged journey with a fair amount of rough road travel. Temperatures can reach into the 90°s F (or higher) and conditions can be dusty.*

## ITINERARY

☞ This trip begins with a rendezvous at the airport in Bamako, Mali. You can arrive at any time on Day 1 of the itinerary.

### **DAY 1 ~ Arrive in Bamako**

Arrive in Bamako, where your trip leader (or a Mountain Travel Sobek representative) will meet you outside the customs and immigration area of the airport and escort you to the hotel. You'll have a free evening to rest up and recover from the long flight.

### **DAY 2 ~ Bamako to Timbuktu**

Today we fly to Timbuktu. Upon arrival, after checking into the hotel, we'll take a short tour of this legendary town. Timbuktu (known by its French colonizers as *Tomboctou*) was founded by Tuareg nomads at the end of the 12th century and was once the capital of a flourishing Tuareg empire. Now landlocked away from the shifting Niger River, Timbuktu was the meeting point for caravans that descended from the Maghreb (the settled area in the northern Sahara that spawned the caravans) to cross the Sahara, and of *pinasse* plying the river with cargoes of gold from the mines of Bourem. In its long history, it has been occupied by the Mandinka, the Songhai people of Gao, then the Moroccans, the Peuls (Fulani) of the kingdom of Macina, and finally again by the Tuaregs. We may wander the markets and visit Djinguereber Mosque, presumably built in the 13th century, and the oldest clay building in Africa.

### **DAY 3 ~ Cruise on the Niger River**

We begin our journey on the Niger River by thatch-roof *pinasse* (a type of pirogue or small, flat-bottomed boat, particularly common with West African fishermen); a gentle trip that gives us an intimate look at life on the river. As we stop at points of interest, we'll see how the river is the heart of Malian life. The river teems with fish, most importantly the species called the "capitaine" (*Lates niloticus*); fishing and trading in dried fish are some of the most important elements of the Malian economy. We'll stop a couple of times during the day to visit local Bozo villages and meet the people who live along the river. Lunch is served aboard the boat and prepared by our own cook. Be sure to bring your binoculars—the Niger is the ornithological paradise of West Africa and all kinds of aquatic birds congregate here.

### **DAY 4 ~ Niger River to Nianfounke to Essakane**

We end the river trip near Niafounké, the home village of the late worldbeat star Ali Farka Touré, who brought Malian folk music to the world's ears. After lunch on board, we set out by four-wheel-drive to reach the desert outpost of Essakane in time for the beginning of the festival.

### **DAYS 5-6 ~ Essakane**

Settle in to desert life among the Tuareg nomads who helped found, along with a few international organizations, the now-famous Festival au Desert. Four thousand revelers come from all over the world to watch traditional

dances, camel races, and swordplay, and to listen to classic African melodies that have now become an integral part of the worldwide music scene.

### **DAY 7 ~ Essakane to Douentza**

After breakfast we'll drive through the desert dunes to the Gourma region, where we may encounter a few Fulani, Tuareg, or Bella camps. With the protection of the Niger River, the Gourma region, which spreads between Timbuktu and Douentza, is a land of savannas mixed with dunes and desert steppes. In the afternoon, we'll visit a tiny narrow village tucked away in the Gandamia Mountains.

### **DAY 8 ~ Douentza to Dogon Cliffs**

We begin our exploration of the Dogon cliffs, taking an easy early morning trek to traditional villages that are visited by few other groups. One of the villages we may visit is located on a sacred mountain; another is built on the side of the escarpment.

The Dogon people are among the most interesting of all the ethnic groups in Mali. As early as the 12th century, they fled to this area in order to retain their cultural and religious traditions in the face of Islamic invasions. The things they hold dear are rooted in the earth and sky, in youth and old age, and in birth and death. Marriages are sometimes arranged even before the birth of a child, with the ceremony taking place with brides as young as 12 years old. A man is not considered an adult until he has produced a child. Water, the giver of life in this arid land, is venerated and is an important symbol in Dogon ceremonies. Most Dogon have chosen to resist the influences of the modern world, and continue to maintain their fascinating traditional society.

Ethnologists are fascinated by the Dogon's ancestor worship, complex cosmology, and simple but unaffected artistic expressions reflected in masks, musical instruments, and ritual dances. Numbering about 450,000, the Dogon are celebrated for the genius of their abstract artwork. Their geometric designs in woodcarvings and masks are acknowledged as a major influence in modern art, having inspired, among others, the young Picasso.

Ingenious Dogon farmers have created green oases around their precariously situated villages by constructing clever irrigation channels. They grow maize, millet, and onions while stocking goats and sheep. We'll admire the artistry of their cone-shaped houses with elaborately carved wooden doors, and learn firsthand about the enduring spiritual life of these animist people.

### **DAY 9 ~ Bandiagara Cliffs**

In the morning, we'll take a path to a village where a dozen people live in incredibly architected adobe dwellings along the 1,500-foot high sandstone walls of Bandiagara Cliffs, a UNESCO World Heritage Site since 1989 (see side bar at right). We'll also have the opportunity to visit with the *Hogon* (high priest).

### **DAY 10 ~ Bandiagara Cliffs**

Today we'll experience one of the exhilarating Dogon masked dances, which includes masks that can reach 15 feet tall and dancers that perform on vertigo-inducing stilts. Dogon masks have deep eyes, framed by vertical and parallel lines—a kind of rectangular box looking at you from another world. They are pure cubist art, with the soul

of a population living in communion with the spirit of ancestors, nature, and the stars. Only men are permitted to be close to the dancers, as masks are related to death and funerals. Women, the givers of life, stay apart, perched on the clay roofs of surrounding houses (even though it's taboo for them to come close, they do not want to miss the performance!)

### **DAY 11 ~ Bandiagara to Mopti**

After breakfast we drive to the city of Mopti, built on three islands where the Bani and Niger rivers converge. The town buzzes with the converging cultures of Bozo fishermen, Dogon, Bambara, and Bella farmers, and Tuareg and Peul shepherds.

We'll take advantage of the diversity by paying a visit to the market and harbor, both of which are saturated with intense

colors and smells. At the harbor, be sure to watch the artisans building their traditional pirogues (wooden boats), from pounding out the nails to painting the sides of their finished creations. Jewelry lovers will be happy to know that Mopti is the regional hub for bead and jewelry sales and trading.

### **DAY 12 ~ Mopti to Djenné**

Continue to Djenné, once a great religious and commercial center located on the Niger River, and today home to wealthy trading families and Koranic schools. Built in the 14th century, and designated a UNESCO World Heritage Site in 1988, Djenné contains the most beautiful and genuine examples of neo-Sudanese adobe architecture in the world today. Here we'll find intricate architectural details like Moroccan windows, Toucouleur gates, and rounded bricks dating back to the time before colonization. This fine Afro-Arab architecture includes the most famous mosque in all of Mali—the largest clay building in the world, including a façade decorated with columns and minarets in the startling fanciful Sudanic style. Be prepared for a colorful crowd to invade the city—this is market day and everyone comes out in their best for the occasion.

### **DAY 13 ~ Djenné to Segou**

After an early breakfast we'll depart for Segou. On the way, we'll visit an area that's been beautifully painted with the classical cosmologist colors of the African people (red, white, and black). During the tour, we'll hear about the initiation rites that take place every three years in this natural amphitheater. We'll also stop for visits at Bobo and Bambara villages along the way.

### **DAY 14 ~ Segou to Bamako – Depart**

The lively Malian capital of Bamako, on the banks of the Niger, is home to the best ethnographic museum in West Africa. Its great collection displays masks, ritual sculptures, archaeological terracotta, textiles, musical instruments, tools, and traditional weapons. After lunch, we'll transfer to day rooms where we can relax and shower before an evening transfer to the airport and departure.

### **Air Travel**

Airfare is not included in the land cost of our trips. For air reservations, we recommend you contact the airlines directly, either by phone or the Internet. In addition, many travelers elect to use their "frequent flyer" miles when traveling with us. **But please check with our staff before purchasing or obtaining your tickets.** We need to verify your arrival and departure schedule and ensure we have enough participants to operate the trip.

## WHAT YOU CAN EXPECT

### **Expert Leadership**

Expert leadership is the key to an exciting, unforgettable experience. Our trips feature gifted leaders for whom leading trips is a true vocation. Besides showing you wonders you'd never find on your own, they make sure everything runs smoothly and safely without a hitch. ### **Lodging, Food, & Vehicles**

Camping nights in remote locations are spent in airy, mosquito-proof, two-person dome tents. You will be provided with a foam sleeping pad (you must bring your own sleeping bag). The camps are somewhat rustic and may involve "roughing it." A toilet tent is provided, as well as a shower tent (except while we are in the desert). Dinners in camp may include West Africa cuisine or Italian specialties. Lunch is cold food, served picnic style. On the Niger *pirogue* journey, our cook prepares excellent meals, including fresh fish from the river. Frequently, we will have imported Italian and French wines. Some of the hotels in the cities are quite good with French food, air conditioning, etc., but we will also be staying at simple guesthouses and camping along the Niger River and in Dogon country.

We will be traveling into remote areas aboard sturdy, all-terrain, air-conditioned Land Cruisers that seat a driver and three passengers. In the cities we may use mini-vans.

### **Activity Level**

Although we rate this trip as "easier," it can be considered, for some people, as moderate to strenuous because of the heat, rustic nature of travel, and long drives. You must be in good physical condition, enjoy an active life, and have recent hiking and camping experience. A spirit of adventure and a positive attitude are musts!

Walks in the Dogon country typically start early in the morning to take advantage of the cooler temperatures. The weather can be hot and the terrain is hilly. Trip members should be prepared to hike two to five hours per day on hiking days. Optional visits to some sites involve bouldering, climbing rustic ladders, and scrambling up cliffs.

If you are not optimally conditioned, we recommend that you start a training program *at least three months* before departure, gradually increasing the intensity and duration. If your health is questionable or your physical capacity is limited, please discuss other trip options with us.

**Note—Minimum age for participation is 12.**

### **Climate**

Mali has a typical dry climate with a rainy season from June to September. The Saharan influence is felt in winter with the ebb of the monsoon and the arrival of dry air masses. The cooler dry season is from November to February (during which our trip takes place), with lows of 45-65°F and highs of 75-90°F. During this time, the humidity is only 5-10%.
